The EU has agreements with over 60 partners. The number of agreements is lower as some agreements cover more than one country, such as the agreement with Colombia and Peru. The table shows agreements in force, so does not include those which have been signed but not yet implemented (such as the CETA agreement with Canada).

The EU's partners in these agreements range from large economies, such as South Korea, to very small economies such as Dominica and St Vincent & the Grenadines. The EU does not have trade agreements in force with a number of the world's largest economies, such as the US, Japan, China and India. The EU is in negotiations with Japan over a trade agreement. The EU is also in negotiations with the US over the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership, although the outlook for this agreement is uncertain.

Of the UK's top 50 export markets for goods in 2015, 10 are covered by trade agreements listed in the table above. Of the other 40, 18 are other EU members and 33 are countries with whom the EU has no trade agreement in force.¹ There is, as yet, no trade agreement with the US which was the UK's largest goods export market in 2015.

The table includes a number of Economic Partnership Agreements. These are trade and development agreements between the EU and African, Caribbean and Pacific countries. EPAs aim to contribute to sustainable development and to reduce poverty. EPAs open up EU markets fully and immediately while permitting the partner countries a longer period to open up their markets.²
