

# **Local elections 2012**

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Elections are due on Thursday 3 May 2012 in 128 English local authorities (including 36 Metropolitan Boroughs) and all Councils in Wales (22 authorities) and Scotland (32 authorities). Elections will also be held on the same day for the Mayor of London and the London Assembly. Referendums will be held in eleven cities in England to determine whether or not to introduce directly-elected mayors.

The first elections for police commissioners in England and Wales are scheduled for 15 November 2012.

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# 1 Where are elections taking place in 2012?

Local elections in England are due to take place on 3 May 2012 in:

- 36 Metropolitan Boroughs in England all by thirds
- 18 Unitary authorities in England 16 by thirds and 2 all-up
- 74 Second-tier districts in England– 63 by thirds, 7 for half the council and 4 all-up
- 22 Councils in Wales and 32 Councils in Scotland
- Elections for the London Mayor and the London Assembly will be held across the 32 London Boroughs on 3 May 2012.
- Also 11 cities in England will hold a referendum to determine whether or not to introduce directly-elected mayors.

On 15 November elections for Police and Crime Commissioners in England and Wales will be held in the 41 police authorities outside London.

### **Elections in 2008**

Most of the seats being contested in 2012 will previously have been fought in 2008. On the basis of the results of those elections in England and Wales, the estimated national equivalent share of vote then was Conservatives 43%, Labour 24%, and Liberal Democrats 23%.

#### 1.3 Scotland

Elections to councils in Scotland were due to have taken place in 2011, however to avoid coinciding with the Scottish Parliament Elections the terms of local government have been extended by one year. As a result local government elections will take place in 2012 and then in 2017. Thereafter, local elections will revert to four year terms so as not to clash with elections to the Parliament.

These local elections will be under a system of Single Transferable Vote (STV), the second since it was introduced for the 2007 local government elections.

### 1.5 London Assembly and Mayor

Elections for the 25 member London Assembly and the London mayor are also scheduled for 3 May 2012.

# 2 Mayors: referendums and election

Referendums under the *Localism Act 2011* will be held in 11 English cities to determine whether or not to introduce directly elected mayors<sup>1</sup>. These will take place in:

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> It is possible for an authority to have a directly elected mayor without a referendum by passing a resolution. The leader of Liverpool City Council has said he wants to do this and hold a vote for an elected mayor without first holding a public referendum.

The Government has announced that where these referendums are in favour of having an elected mayor, the elections for mayors will be on the same day as the polls for police commissioners, 15 November 2012.<sup>2</sup>

Following a petition to the local authority a referendum was held on 26 January 2012 to decide whether **Salford** should elect a Mayor for Salford City Council. 18% of those eligible voted and 56% voted for an elected mayor. (17,344 yes; 13,653 no). It is probable that the Salford Mayor will be elected on 3 May 2012.

A referendum is to be held over whether **Doncaster** should retain its elected mayor or switch to a council leader, the exact date has not yet been decided. Doncaster has had an elected mayor since 2002 and the post is currently held by Peter Davies of the English Democrats.

### 3 Police commissioners

The first elections for Police and Crime Commissioners in England and Wales will be held on 15 November 2012 in each of the 41 police force areas outside London.<sup>3</sup>
