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The National Lottery

This paper outlines how money raised from National Lottery ticket sales is distributed between prize money, good causes, Camelot and the Government.

It presents data on the distribution of awards by good cause, constituency and region.

Finally, this paper examines the chances of winning the lottery and the pattern of winning numbers.

This paper updates research paper 00/24.

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Summary of main points

- Nearly £33 billion has been spent on all lottery games between the launch in November 1994 and the end of June 2001.¹ On average, £50 million has been spent in each constituency.
- Over £10 billion had been raised for good causes by the end of June 2001. By the end of Camelot's 7-year licence in September 2001, the Lottery may have made £11 billion for good causes.
- 88,900 Lottery awards had been made by the end of June 2001, with an average value of £107,800 each.
- London had the highest value of awards per head and the highest average value of awards; both were over twice the national average.
- Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland had the highest number of awards per million population. The Eastern and South East regions had the lowest value of awards per head and the smallest number of awards per million population.
- On average, each parliamentary constituency has received 131 awards with a total value of £14.1 million per constituency.
- The constituency of Holborn and St. Pancras has received the most Lottery grants (665), Greenwich and Woolwich had the highest value of awards (£673 million²).
- The constituency which has received the fewest awards from the Lottery is Hayes and Harlington with 21. Denton and Reddish has been awarded the lowest value of awards, at £485,000.
- £648 million was paid to the Exchequer in Lottery Duty, corporation tax and VAT in 1999/00, representing 12.9 per cent of sales.

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I Introduction

The National Lottery was established under the *National Lottery etc Act 1993*, and the first draw was on 14 November 1994. Just under 30 million people play it regularly, by buying tickets for the two weekly main game draws, either of the other 'on-line' games -Thunderball and Lottery Extra, or purchasing 'instant-win' scratchcards. In the latest financial year, 1999/00, ticket sales were worth just over £5.1 billion. Total ticket sales to the end of June 2001 have been just over £33 billion³.

A. Distribution of sales

Over the lifetime of the current Lottery licence, the money from ticket sales will be allocated in the following proportions:

50%	Prize winners
28%	National Lottery Distribution Fund
13%	Lottery Duty, Corporation Tax and VAT
5%	Retailer commission
3%	Camelot operating expenses
1%	Profit

Table 1 on page 9 shows figures from Camelot's accounts for the financial years since 1994/95. In 1999/00 ticket sales totalled £5.1 billion. Of this, £2.5 billion was given in prize money, £0.6 billion was paid in Lottery Duty and £1.4 billion was paid to the National Lottery Distribution Fund (NLDF).

Preliminary results for 2000/01 show a decline in total sales of 2.1%, continuing the trend for the last three years. The reductions in instant and online sales were broadly similar. The total raised for good causes was £1.4 billion, making the cumulative total £8.9 billion.⁴

1. National Lottery Distribution Fund

The largest part of the money accruing to the National Lottery Distribution Fund (NLDF) comes from the Ticket Sales Payment as set out in the licence agreement. Each week Camelot is obliged to pay a percentage of net (after Lottery Duty) ticket sales to the NLDF. The percentages are set for different levels of ticket sales such that the marginal rate of payment to the NLDF increases with ticket sales. In 1999/00 28.1% of sales were paid to the NLDF.

There are also other transfers to the NLDF. The aggregate value of all unclaimed prizes for which the claim period has expired is paid to the NLDF. In 1999/00 total unclaimed prize money paid into the NLDF was £91 million⁵, which is about 0.4% of prize money.

2. Government

Lottery Duty has been set at 12%. Lottery Duty is intended to be revenue-neutral, making up for lost VAT on other retail sales. If spending is diverted to lottery tickets from products attracting high levels of duty (alcohol, tobacco etc.) then the Exchequer loses out. Conversely if spending is diverted from low-taxed items (confectionery, newspapers) or from planned savings, the Exchequer gains. As ticket sales have been higher than forecast, so has the amount raised from Lottery Duty. Table 1 shows that a total of £3.2 billion had been paid in Lottery Duty by the end of financial year 1999/00.

Other payments to the Exchequer will include Corporation Tax on Camelot's profits. This tax amounted to £121 million in the first six financial years of operation. As sales of Lottery tickets are exempt from VAT, VAT is not recoverable on the company's costs and is therefore a charge against profits. The VAT charge for Camelot for 1999/00 was £19 million compared with £18 million in 1998/99; this includes VAT on capital expenditure. In 1999/00 the total amount raised by the Exchequer from the Lottery in terms of Lottery Duty, Corporation Tax and VAT was £664 million, or 12.7% of ticket sales.

3. Retailers

The Camelot retailer agreement allows retailers to earn 5% commission on sales of both the on-line and instants games, as well as earning 1% commission on prizes paid out between £10 and £200. For this reason, the proportion of sales going to retailers has been around 5.1% in each year. Retailer commission for the year 1999/00 totalled £258 million and since the launch, on-line retailers have benefited by an average £38,000 commission per outlet.⁶

4. Camelot

After Lottery Duty, payments to the NLDF, retailers' commission and prizes, Camelot was left with around 4.9% of ticket sales in 1999/00. £195 million or 3.8% of ticket sales was paid in operating costs, consisting mainly of advertising and marketing expenditure, administration costs and depreciation. Operating costs also include terminal and data communication costs - mainly the cost of maintaining the terminals and on-line lottery network. This left profit after tax at around 0.8% of ticket sales or about £40 million.

B. Distribution of Lottery funds to good causes

When Camelot's 7-year licence to run the Lottery began in November 1994, it was expected that the total sales of the Lottery would amount to £32 billion, of which £9 billion would go to good causes. According to the most recent official forecasts the Lottery was expected to generate between £11.0 billion and £11.6 billion for good causes by the end of the licence in September 2001⁷, which would imply total ticket sales in the region of £40 billion. However the figures for actual ticket sales up to the end of June 2001 have been only just over £33 billion.⁸ Funds available for good causes will therefore be somewhat lower than these forecasts.

The distributing bodies which allocate Lottery funds for six good causes are:

- The Arts Councils for England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland⁹
- The Community Fund¹⁰
- The National Heritage Memorial Fund
- The UK Sports Council & the Sports Councils for England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland
- The Millennium Commission
- The New Opportunities Fund (NOF)

A list of addresses and contact details is given in Appendix 4 of this paper.

Each of the fifteen bodies are responsible for sifting through the applications made to them for Lottery money, determining which are eligible, and deciding which among these should be awarded a grant. They are required to comply with directions given by the Secretary of State, on matters of policy and financial propriety - but the Secretary of State does *not* have any role in deciding which applications for Lottery grants are successful. In one respect the relationship between the Secretary of State and NOF is different, as the Minister has the power to specify which initiatives NOF should finance,¹¹ although again he does not have any responsibility for the success or failure of any specific grant application.

The financial directions given by the Minister establish the statutory responsibility for each distributing body to ensure that the grants they have awarded are spent for the purposes to which they were made. Generally speaking, in the event of the successful applicant ceasing to operate, the Lottery grant will become repayable to the distributing body.

The New Opportunities Fund (NOF) - the new sixth good cause - was set up under the *National Lottery Act 1998* and started inviting applications for grants in January 1999.¹² The creation of NOF was set out in the White Paper *A People's Lottery* published in July 1997.¹³ At this time, the predicted size of the NLDF over the seven-year licence had risen to £10 billion: £1 billion more than first estimated. It was proposed that this extra £1 billion be channelled into a new fund to support initiatives in health, education and the environment and a one-off £200 million grant to set up NESTA.¹⁴

By October 1998 the official estimate of the NLDF over its lifetime had risen to £10.6 billion and the Government proposed splitting the proceeds so that £1.9 billion was given to arts, charities, heritage and sport, £2.0 billion to the Millennium Commission, and the remainder to NOF.¹⁵ By May 1999 this estimate had risen by a further £250 million, of which it was anticipated that NOF would take one-third, and the remaining four original causes share the remaining two thirds.¹⁶

Finally in October 1999 the Government published estimates, based on three different scenarios, showing the forecast income for the good causes at £11.21 billion (medium forecast), pitched between a low forecast of £11.02 billion and a high forecast of £11.64 billion. Taking this medium forecast, it was anticipated that the Fund would be shared by the six good causes as follows:

More recent estimates of the Lottery's yield for good causes over its first seven years do not appear to have been published.¹⁸

Legislation amending each distributing body's percentage share of the NLDF was introduced in February 1999.¹⁹ For a temporary 13-week period starting on 15 February, the shares of the NLDF going to arts, charities, heritage and sport were 5%, as NOF's share rose to 60%.²⁰ From 17 May 1999, the share of the first four bodies returned to 16²/₃%, as NOF's share fell to 13¹/₃%. The Secretary of State has given guarantees that there will be no further change to the percentages of these four original good causes up to and beyond the end of the licence.²¹

When the Millennium Commission was set up under the *National Lottery etc Act 1993*, it was anticipated that its funding life would end on 31 December 2000. Following the decision to go ahead with the Millennium Exhibition at Greenwich in December 1996, the Conservative Government indicated that it was likely that the Commission's funding would be extended for one year, to enable it to meet its commitments.²² In December 2000 the Government laid an Order (SI 2000/3355) to end the Commission's funding on 20 August 2001, and capping its total grant from the NLDF at £2,285.5 million. The Commission's budget has been increased by £270 million, to take account of its additional grants to the Millennium Exhibition during 2000, and to sponsor a small number of additional projects.²³ A companion Order (SI 2000/3356) was laid at this time to increase NOF's share to 33¹/₃% from 21 August 2001 – leaving the percentage shares of the other four good causes unchanged.²⁴

In the case of four of the six good causes, the share of money received by each country in the United Kingdom is specified. The money allotted to arts and sports is divided among the four countries of the UK according to population, though in the case of sports, a 'top' slice of 9.2% goes to the UK Sports Council for UK-wide projects.²⁵ The figures for sport in the table do not therefore add up to 100%. The UK Sports Council was established in July 1998; its share of Lottery funds come from that part of the NLDF already allocated to the good cause of sport.²⁶

Both the Community Fund and NOF divide their share between the four countries on the basis of population figures weighted for deprivation. For NOF, these shares are specified in the policy directions issued to the Fund by the Secretary of State (the current directions were issued on 26 April 1999). The allocation of the NOF's future income between home countries will be reviewed before decisions are made on the next round of initiatives.

For the Community Fund these shares are self-imposed. Similar arrangements do not apply to either heritage or millennium funding. The geographical distribution of funds across these four causes is shown below:

In addition each distributing body is required under the policy directions issued by the Secretary of State to ensure that all parts of the country have access to funding, and to take into account the need to reduce economic and social deprivation – and to show how they are to achieving this in their strategic plans.²⁸

Each distributor sets its own levels of expected partnership funding (that is, the degree to which a project will need to attract funding from other sources). In doing so they seek an element of partnership funding commensurate with the ability of different kinds of applicants, or applicants in particular areas, to obtain such support. In some instances this may result in 100% Lottery funding. Volunteer time and other contributions in kind may be considered as providing partnership support.²⁹

Those considering an application for Lottery funding are best advised to contact the relevant distributing body directly and obtain an application pack. This gives guidance on eligibility, as well as setting out the mechanics of making an application. Each of the distributors has an internet site, which provides a considerable amount of information on grant programmes and application procedures; addresses are given in Appendix 1 to this note. Recently the distributing bodies have established a 'one-stop shop' for information on Lottery programmes on the internet³⁰ which provides guidance on the application process and information on awards

already granted.³¹ In addition the monthly journal *Lottery Monitor* regularly publishes a summary list of all current grant programmes.³² The magazine maintains an internet site with a useful list of links to Lottery-associated organisations.³³

In August 2000 the DCMS published a report by the Quality, Efficiency and Standards Team (QUEST) on the cost of making an application for Lottery funding, for awards of up to £100,000; the report includes a suggested ideal application form for grants of this size, which potential applicants may wish to study.³⁴ Phase two of this exercise is to look at the costs inherent in the application process for larger grants, both to applicants and Lottery distributors.³⁵

Many organisations have been unsuccessful in attracting Lottery funding. Since the National Lottery began, applications for funds have always outstripped the funds available by a considerable margin - and although prospective applicants have lowered their expectations of late, this remains the case. For example, of the 98,026 grant applications the Community Fund/NLCB has received since it was established in 1995, 62,253 (63 per cent) were unsuccessful.³⁶ In this context it is unsurprising that many worthy causes may have found it difficult to win grants - and, given the sheer diversity of applicants, that some commentators have taken exception to some successful grants for certain causes, because they find little sympathy with the cause itself.

It is important to stress that Lottery grants are not awarded solely on the basis of the 'worthiness' - if one can put it that way - of the cause that is to be funded. Important factors in a successful application will include, addressing the criteria and policy of the relevant distributing body; appropriate financial and management structures; evidence of need; and, commitment to equal opportunities in policy and practice and user involvement. Finally, it is worth underlining that unsuccessful applicants are not prevented from reapplying.

II Analysis of awards

The data used in this section are taken from the Department for Culture Media and Sport's (DCMS) Awards Database and are those awards that were *notified* to the DCMS by 30 June 2001. DCMS are reliant on the distributing bodies to provide details of individual awards. In some cases the awarding bodies may have announced awards but not yet given details to DCMS. This may mean that awards that were made up to a few months ago are not included, this will particularly affect the figures in Tables 3 and 4. In addition, the geographical location is not given for a number of awards. This may be because it is not possible to do so, or due to gaps in the data provided to DCMS. A. National analysis

Table 2 shows the number and value of awards by distributing body for awards on the Department's database at the end of March 2001. Tables 3, 4 and 5 give the value, number and average value of awards by good cause and year respectively.

The number, and hence the average value of awards, varies greatly between the good causes. The average value of Millennium awards was more than eight times that for all awards and almost twenty times the average for charity awards. There has been a very clear fall in the average value of awards since 1996. This has been enlarged by the fall in millennium awards; however, the average value has fallen for each good cause.

a. Awards by value

The table below shows the number of awards by value.

Nearly half of all awards were less than £5,000 and over three-quarters were of less than £50,000. Very large awards can take up a significant proportion of funds to be distributed to good causes, depending on the cause itself. These awards tend to be for national or regional projects. The following series of tables gives an indicator of this. They show the ten largest awards made under each good cause so far. The largest award has been the £628 million for the Millennium Dome which is more than five times the value of the next largest award. In general, millennium and sports have the largest number of very high value awards. The top 10 awards have accounted for over half the value of millennium awards and over one fifth the value of sports awards. In contrast, there have only been eight charity awards of over £1 million and the ten largest awards account for less than 1% of the total amount awarded. Most of the awards in these tables were made in the first few years of the operation of the Lottery, reflecting the reduction in the average value shown earlier.

B. Regional and constituency analysis of awards

This section of the paper examines the breakdown of lottery awards by good cause, region, and constituency. Awards have been allocated to individual regions and constituencies mainly on the basis of the postal address of the recipient body. This may not accurately reflect all those who benefit from the award, especially when awards are analysed by smaller geographical areas. Some awards that are allocated to individual constituencies are for institutions that are considered of national or regional importance. These awards are intended to benefit a broad spectrum of the population; figures for these constituencies may therefore overestimate the relative benefit to local residents.

The DCMS has estimated that awards to regional and national organisations account for around 60% of the total awarded to London.³⁷ Other areas seem to gain from high value awards that benefit a far wider area. For instance, an award of £43.5 million to Sustrans, to help create a national cycle network, is allocated to Bristol West constituency.

2,700 awards with a total value of nearly £100 million have not (yet) been allocated to a region or constituency. A large proportion of these are sports awards; particularly those made by The Sport Scotland and UK Sport to individual athletes or sports. These ‘unallocated’ awards from Sport Scotland sum to £18.7 million,³⁸ those from UK Sport total £23.5 million. The Sport Scotland figures are **not** included in either the regional or constituency analyses, which will therefore underestimate the value of awards to this area. In addition, ‘unallocated’ New Opportunities Fund awards total over £43 million. A large number of these awards have been added in recent months and geographical details may be added at a later date.

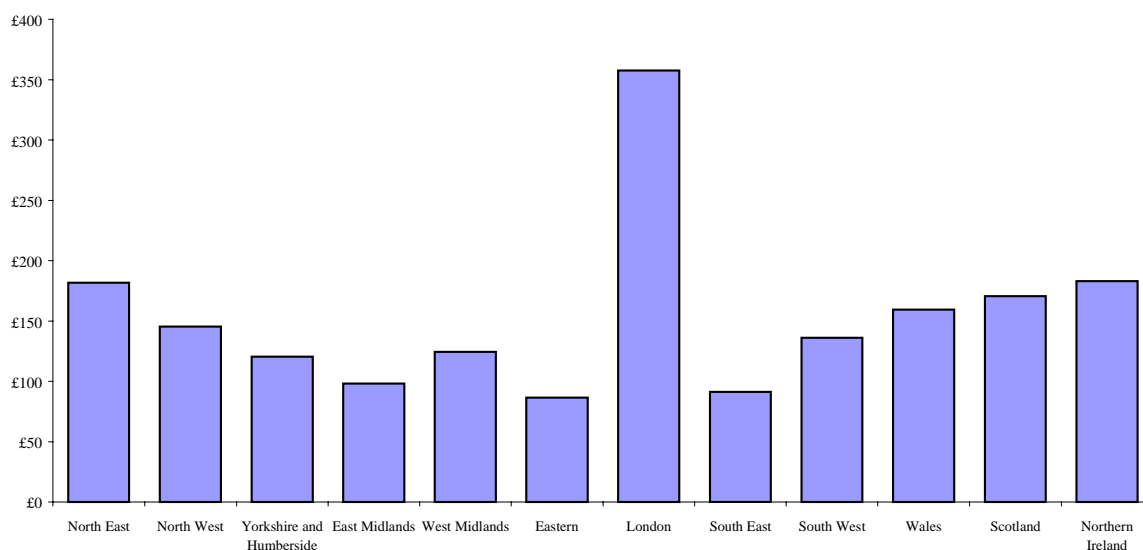

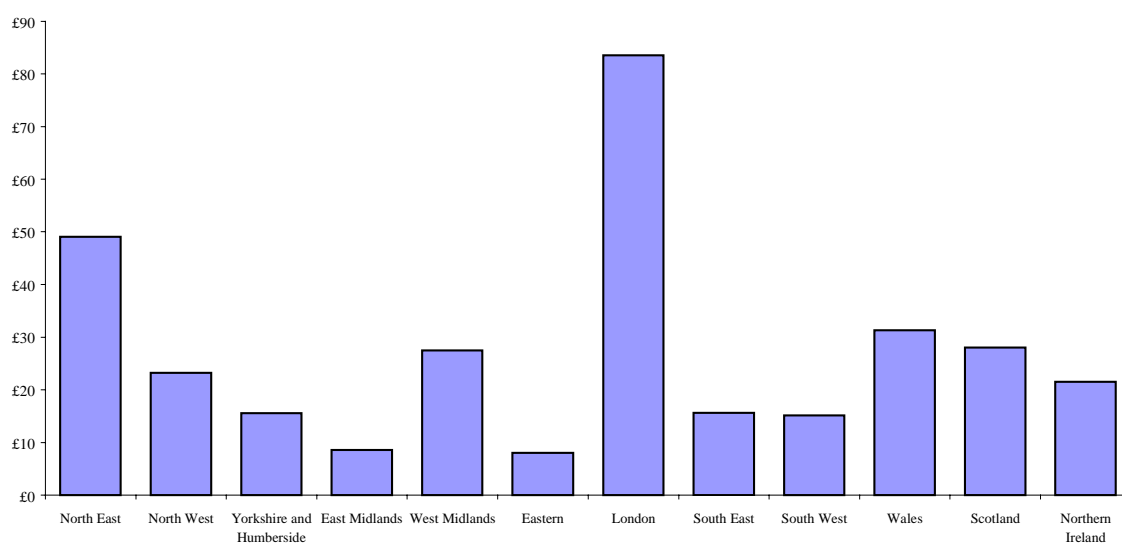

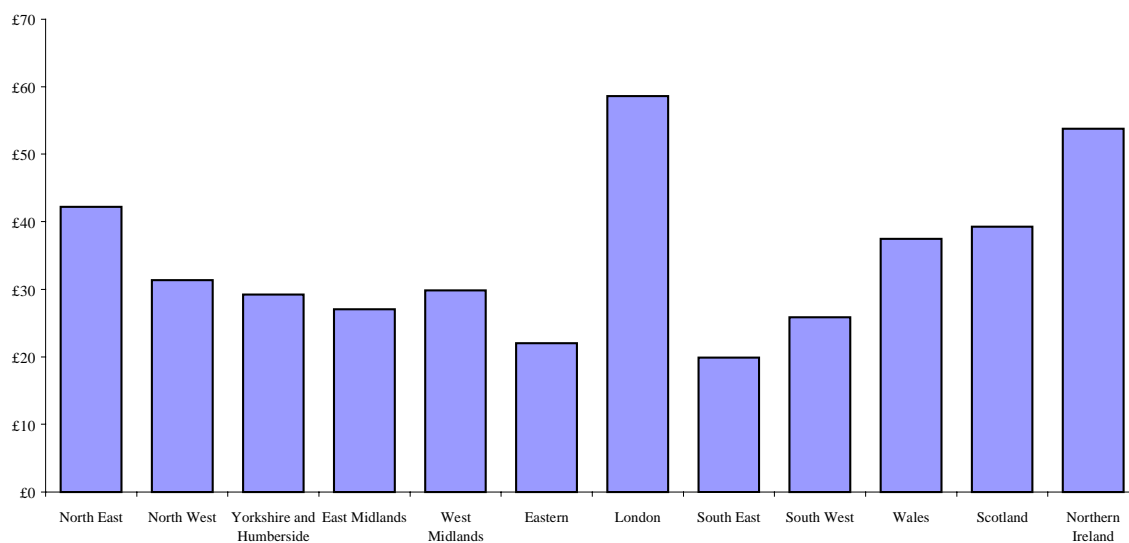

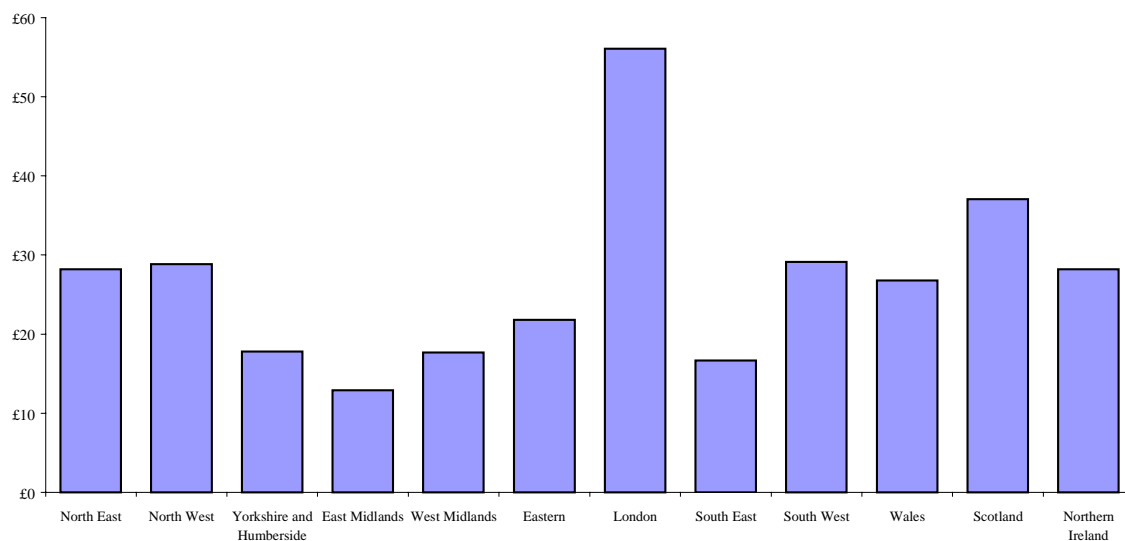

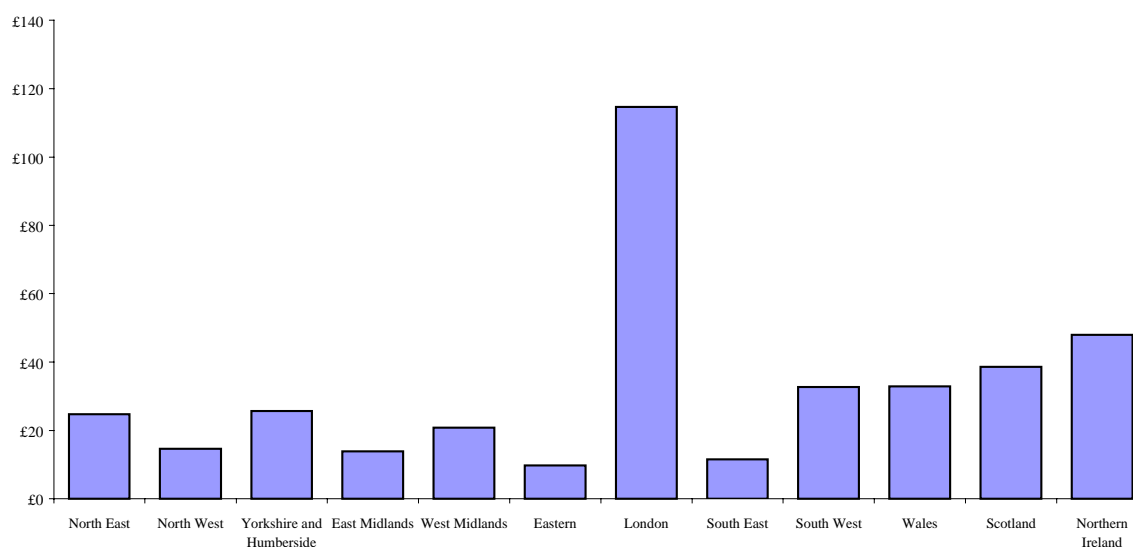

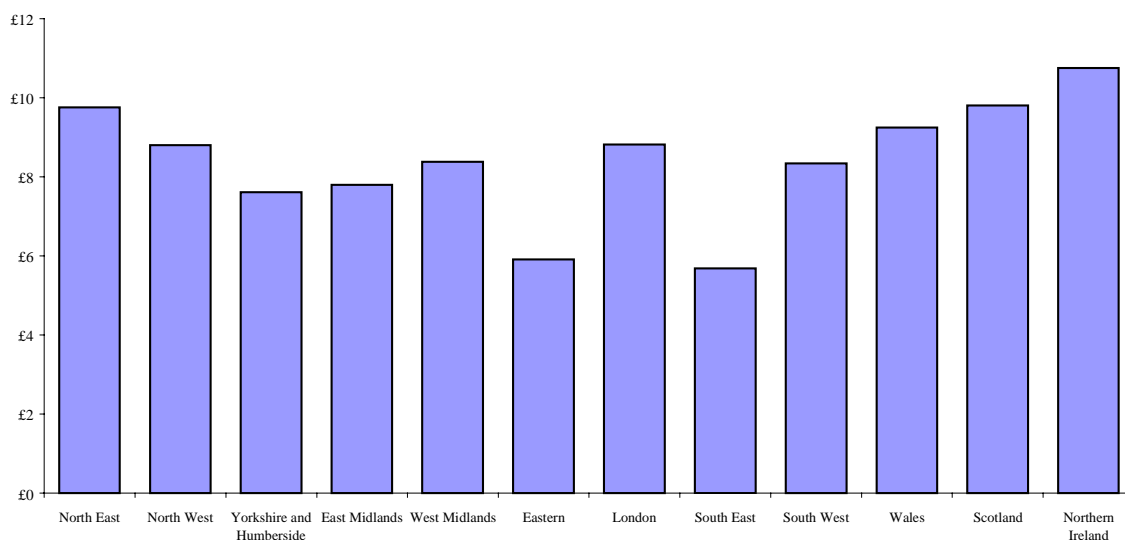

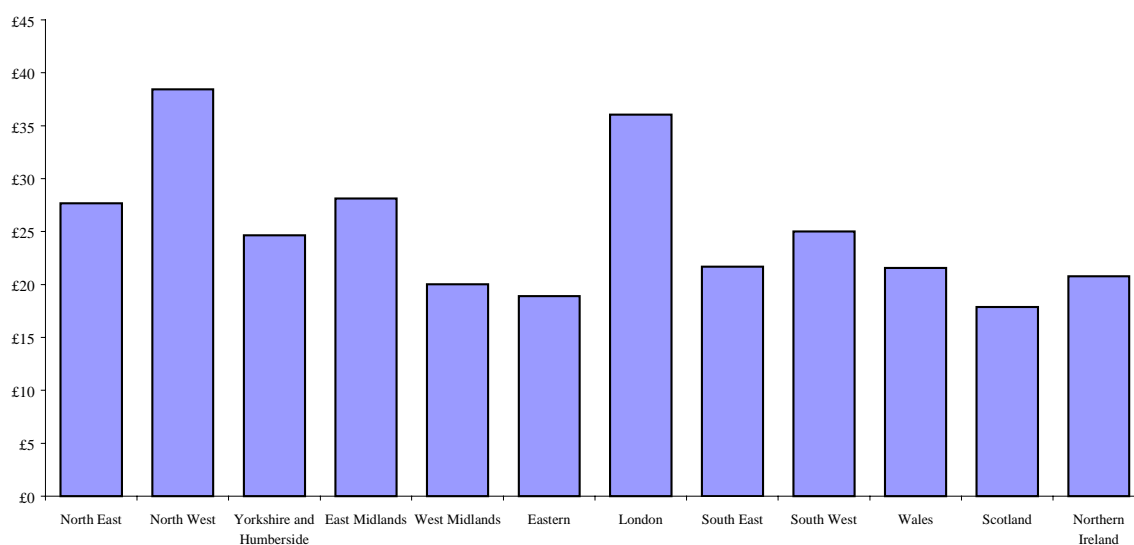

2. Awards by constituency

Table 15 shows the 25 constituencies with the highest and lowest number and value of awards. It should be noted that the award to the New Millennium Experience Company (NMEC) for the Millennium Dome was originally assigned to the company's address in Westminster. This has been changed to the actual site of the Dome in Greenwich, with obvious effects for the constituencies involved. Greenwich and Woolwich constituency now has the highest value of awards, £673 million. Holborn and St. Pancras has received 665 Lottery awards, the most of any constituency. Hayes and Harlington has received the lowest number of awards with just 21. Denton and Reddish has been awarded the lowest value of awards, at £485,000, compared with a constituency average of £14.1 million.

Appendices 1 and 2 show the number and value of awards respectively for each constituency, along with a ranking

The following chart illustrates the distribution of awards by constituency. This shows that a relatively small number of constituencies had particularly high numbers of awards. 37 (5.6%) had more than double the average number and only 6 had more than treble the average. 90% of constituencies were in the range of 55-215 awards. The total value of awards was distributed less evenly between constituencies.

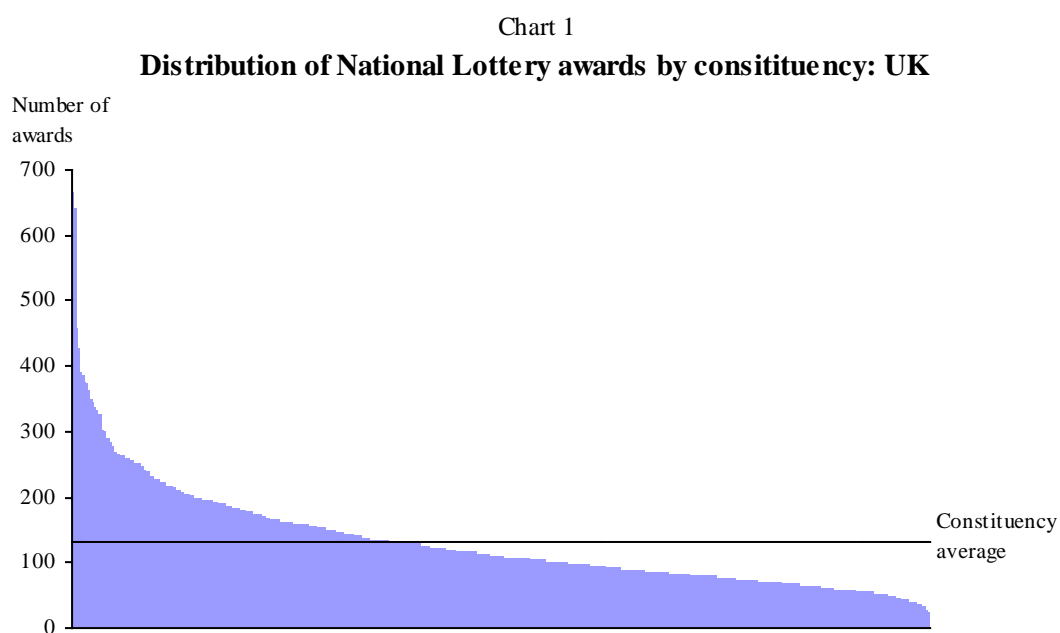

III Ticket Sales

Chart 2 shows National Lottery ticket sales from each week from the first draw on 19 November 1994 to the week ending 14 July 2001.

Saturday draw

- Excluding rollover weeks, sales for the Saturday draw averaged around £60 million for the first few months of the Lottery. This rose to an average of around £70 million by the end of 1995. The average remained between £68 million and £70 million for the whole of 1996.
- Following the introduction of the Wednesday draw in February 1997, sales dropped back to an average of around £60 million per week. There have been gradual falls since then, the average for the year ending 31 March 2001 was £51 million.

Wednesday draw

- Sales for the Wednesday draws currently average around £26 million per week and have been around this level since its introduction.

New games

- The Thunderball game was introduced in June 1999, sales peaked at £6.4 million in the first week and currently average around £4.5 million per week
- The Lottery Extra games were introduced in November 2000. Saturday sales currently average around £1.5 million, Wednesday sales average around £1.0 million

Total On-line sales (chart 2)

- Online sales were around £69 million per week prior to the introduction of the Wednesday draw. They rose to an average of around £90 million in 1998. Since then the sales of the Saturday and Wednesday main draws have declined very gradually.
- There are distinct peaks in sales which are normally associated with rollover weeks. The highest online sales were in the week ending 6 January 1996, a double rollover, when sales reached £127.8 million for the Saturday draw.³⁹
- The introduction of the Thunderball and Extra games has not significantly reversed the decline in total online sales. Average sales since their introduction were around £82 million per week.
- Total sales over Camelot's seven-year licence period were originally projected at around £32 billion. In the last two financial years lottery ticket sales have been below forecast. However, cumulative sales are still over £3 billion, or 14% above forecast up to the end of 1999-00. (Table 16).⁴⁰

Scratchcards

- Weekly data on scratchcard sales is not available after August 1999. Data by financial year is given in Table 2 on page 15.
- Scratchcard sales averaged around £40 million per week for the first few weeks after their introduction in March 1995. Sales declined steadily to around £20 million per week by March 1996 and average around £11½ million for 1999.
- The latest data is for the 24 weeks to September 2000 when sales averaged £10.5 million per week.⁴¹

Data on ticket sales by constituency, covering the first five years of the National Lottery were produced in Library Research Paper 00/24.⁴²

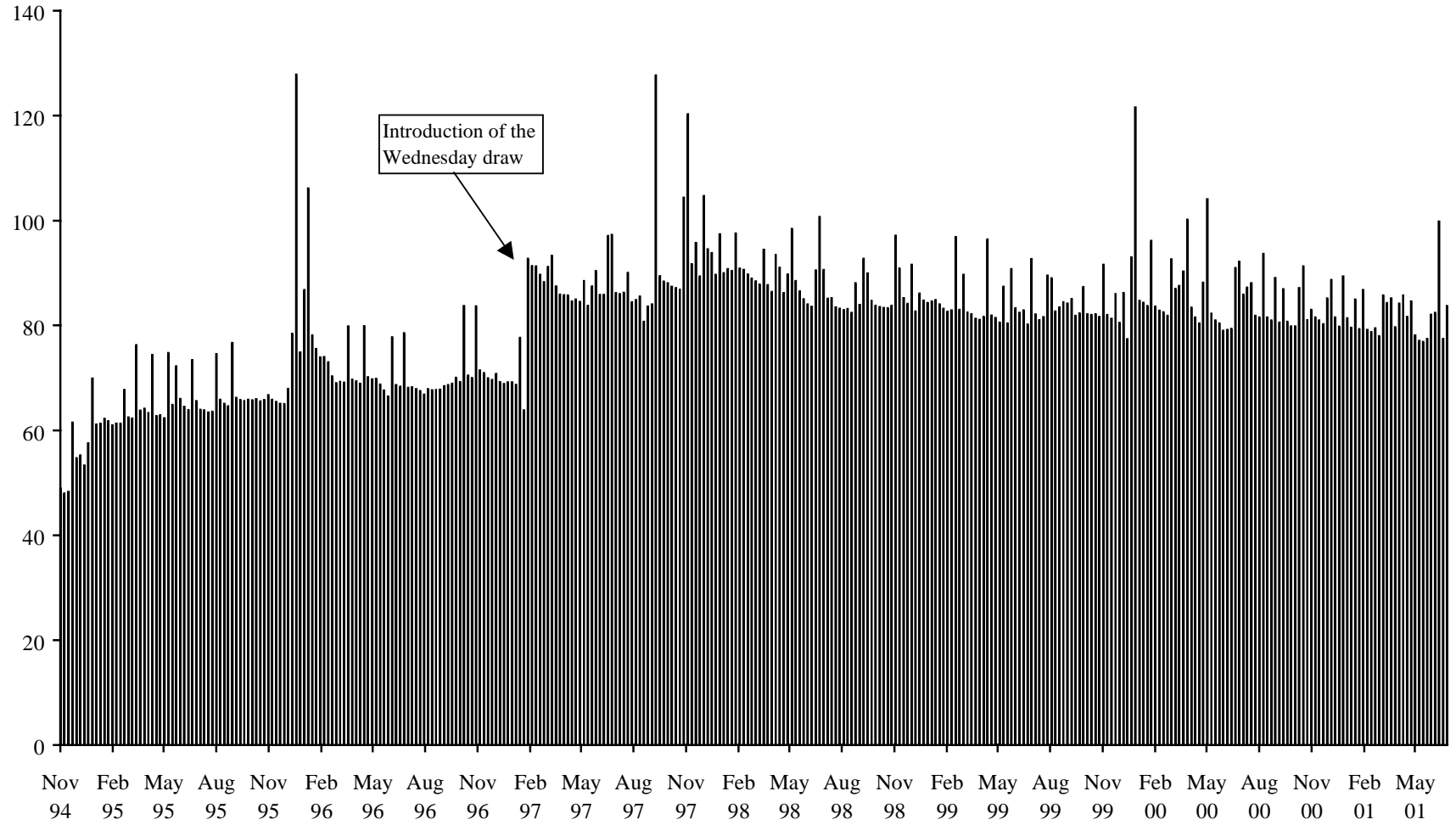

Appendix 3: National Lottery – facts and figures

Players

Just under 30 million people play the National Lottery regularly, which is about 65% of the eligible adult population. The average spend on the National Lottery Game is £3.42 a week. About one quarter of players are members of a syndicate.⁴³

Chances of winning

The chances of winning the Jackpot (i.e. matching all six balls) is approximately 1 in 14 million. The table below sets out the probability of winning all the different prizes. The odds of winning *any* prize is the sum of these probabilities: 1 in 54.

Winners

There are about 1 million winners every week. Since the lottery started there have been around 500 million winning tickets, of which 2,020 have been for the Jackpot. The average Jackpot size is £2 million and since most winners are in a syndicate, a typical winner walks home with about £600,000.

Number Frequency

Each numbered ball has the same chance as any other of being chosen by the machine. But, due to random variation, the spread of numbers drawn is unlikely to be evenly distributed over this period of time. The attached chart three shows the frequency distribution of the lottery balls in numerical order.⁴⁴ Number 38 has been drawn the most as a main ball, 96 times, compared to numbers 13 and 20 which have been drawn 52 times. Chart four shows

(out of possible 580)

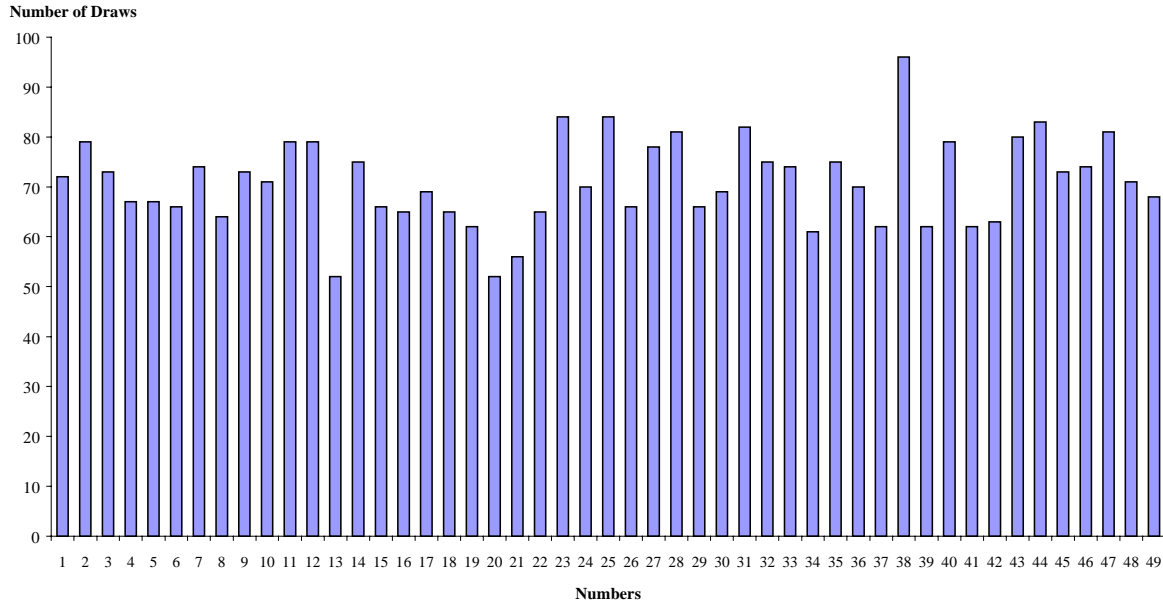
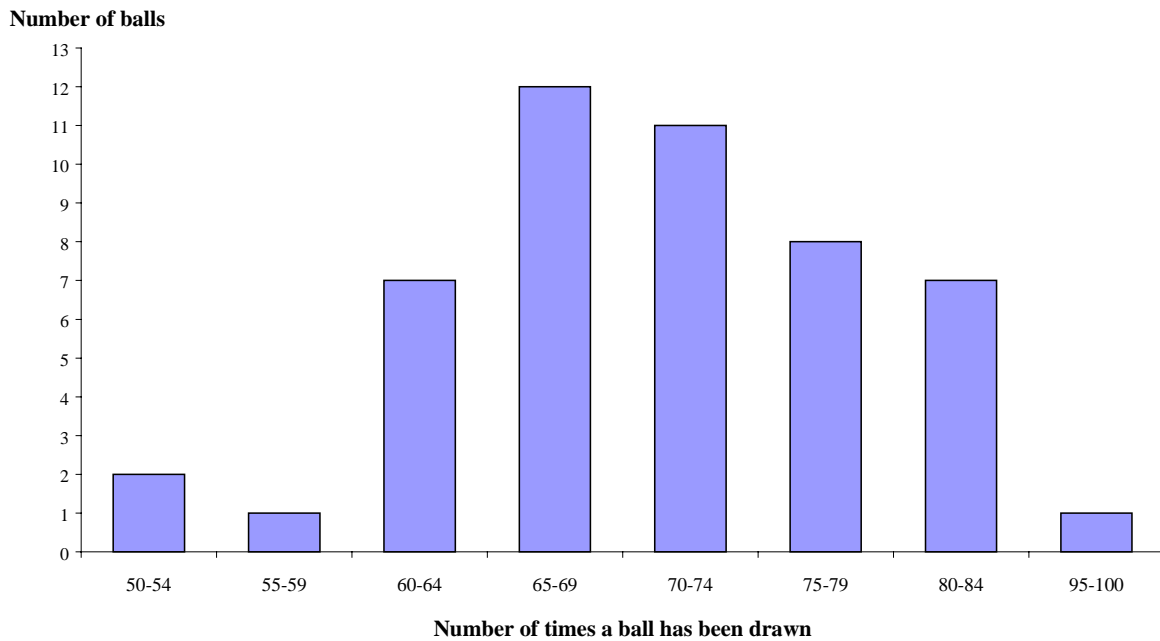


Chart 4 - Frequency distribution of Lottery Balls in the main draw
