



Sources of Statistics: Scotland

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This note is a brief self-help guide to key sources of social statistics for Scotland, providing a starting point for those interested in obtaining statistics for themselves. Contact details of relevant Library staff dealing with different areas of social statistics are also provided.

Increasingly, key data sources are available online. Links to relevant websites and publications are contained within the text of this note, with footnotes detailing the web addresses for hard copy readers. As far as possible links lead to parent web pages, from which the user can choose the specific report they require.

While at the time of printing all hyperlinks are current, some of these links may, from time to time, become out of date. If you experience any problems connecting to a document, please inform the Statistics Resource Unit via hclsru@parliament.uk.

A. Introduction

In most cases, the main source of statistics for Scotland is the statistics section of the [Scottish Government](#)¹ website.

[Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics](#)² (SNS) is the key source of small area statistics for Scotland. It is Scotland's equivalent to the Office for National Statistics' (ONS) Neighbourhood site, but its standard geography is for constituency areas of the Scottish Parliament. It does not have data for Westminster constituencies. The SNS site is the main way in which the Scottish Government will disseminate the range of small area statistics including information on health, education, poverty, unemployment, housing, population, crime and social/community issues at the data zone level and above.

ONS themselves publish [Regional Trends](#)³, which features statistical and analytical comparisons of key social and economic countries and regions of the UK.

B. Agriculture & Forestry

Library Statisticians: Oliver Hawkins (x2324), Rachael Harker (x5061)

The main source of data for Scotland is the [Agriculture, Fisheries and Rural](#) section of the Scottish Government website.⁴ This is broken down into six main sections: Sustainable Farming, Fisheries, Food and Drink Industry, Livestock, Rural Areas and Forestry. High level statistics are summarised in the PDF document [Agriculture and Fisheries Trends](#).⁵ The website also includes summary sheets for local areas in its annual [Agricultural Census](#)⁶ and a number of agricultural [maps](#)⁷ of Scotland.

The Scottish Government also produces the annual publication [Scottish Sea Fisheries Statistics](#).⁸ It provides an overview of the Scottish fishing fleet, fishermen employed and landings data.

The Forestry Commission Great Britain publication [Forestry Facts and Figures](#), compiled by the ONS, gives key statistics for the UK.⁹ The [Forestry Commission Scotland](#) serves as the forestry department of the Scottish Government.¹⁰

C. Attitudes & Opinions

Library Statisticians: Richard Cracknell (x4632), Feargal McGuinness (x4310)

The Scottish Centre for Social Research have produced the [Scottish Social Attitudes \(SSA\)](#)¹¹ series of surveys since 1999 to provide data on a range of social, moral and political attitudes including a module on *Scottish attitudes to Government, the economy and public services in Scotland* (part-funded by the Scottish Government).

[UK Polling Report](#)¹² brings together of variety of surveys and opinion polls relating to Scotland.

D. Civil Service

Library Statisticians: Feargal McGuinness (x4310), Richard Cracknell (x4632)

The National Statistics publication [Civil Service Statistics](#) is produced on an annual basis. It includes the geographical distribution of civil servants by department and responsibility level as well as geographical variations in the diversity of Civil Service personnel.¹³ On-line versions back to 1970 are available as pdf documents from the [statistics archive](#).¹⁴

The Scottish Executive's policy on public sector pay is set out in annual reports [Public Sector Pay Policy for Staff Pay Remits](#)¹⁵ and [Public Sector Pay Policy for Senior Appointments](#).¹⁶ Pay of the judiciary and the Senior Civil Service are reserved to the UK Government; for more details see the [Review Body on Senior Salaries Report](#)¹⁷ published by the Office of Manpower Economics.

E. Crime & Justice

Library Statistician: Gavin Berman (x3851), Roderick McInnes (x3793)

The main source of data for Scotland is the [Crime and Justice Statistics](#) section of the Scottish Government website.¹⁸ This is broken down into eight main sections: Crime, Disorder and Danger, Fire, Policing, Violent Crime, Criminal Justice, Drugs and Alcohol and Civil Justice. [Crime and Justice publications](#)¹⁹ are published annually, at varying times of the year. High level statistics are summarised in [Crime and Justice Trends](#).²⁰

In addition, [Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics](#) gives some crime and justice data by area.²¹ This includes information on: Crimes and offences recorded by the police; Crime rates per 10,000 population; Criminal Justice Social Work; Clear-up Rates and Homicide. It also contains indicators showing selected crimes and offences chosen based on relevance to deprivation at the neighbourhood level.

F. Defence

Library Statisticians: Gavin Berman (x3851), Tom Rutherford (x4313)

Personnel:

The main source of defence statistics is [Defence Analytical Services and Advice \(DASA\)](#)²², which provides specialist analysis and statistical services to the Ministry of Defence (MoD). DASA's statistical page provides links to [statistics on armed forces and civilian personnel](#).²³

Its annual compendium, [UK Defence Statistics](#),²⁴ brings together much of the data available on defence.

Expenditure:

Planned defence expenditure is outlined in [MoD Annual Report and Accounts](#).²⁵ The implementation of Resource Accounting and Budgeting (RAB) has affected the time series comparability of defence expenditure data. It is only possible to compare total MoD expenditure either pre or post 2001/02. Caution should also be exercised when attempting to compare outturn figures with planned expenditure. Outturn figures include AME and expenditure on operations and conflict prevention, while planned expenditure does not.

G. Economy

Library Statisticians: Adam Mellows-Facer (x4904), Grahame Allen – UK (x3977),

The Scottish Executive website provides a range of economic data. The [Scottish Economic Statistics](#)²⁶ section provides quick data for each Scottish local authority, available from the drop down menu. The annual publication [Scottish Economic Statistics](#)²⁷ provides a more detailed account of the Scottish economy, including chapters on:

- Economic accounts (GDP, output, exports, input-output)
- Enterprises
- Industry sectors
- The labour market
- The household sector
- The public sector

Official estimates of Gross Value Added (GVA, GDP excluding taxes and subsidies on production) for Scotland are available at regional and sub-regional level in the ONS publication [Regional Gross Value Added](#)²⁸. The most recent regional figures are for 2010 and for sub-regional figures are for 2009.

Scottish Enterprise work with companies to help them improve performance and efficiency. Their [key facts](#)²⁹ bulletin overviews a host of areas including of industries and their jobs, nation and city population profiles, business statistics, data on education, the housing market and business innovation. Their publication, [Economic Review of Scotland](#)³⁰, is a compilation of Scottish economic statistics. It includes some regional data, as well as a comparison of statistics to other European nations.

H. Education

Library Statisticians: Paul Bolton (x6969), Feargal McGuinness (x4310)

General:

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) provides a data summary in chapter 6 of the [Annual Abstract of Statistics](#) which gives UK wide data.³¹ Figures include numbers of schools or departments by type and full-time and part-time pupils by age and gender. Pupil/teacher ratios are also covered, as are pupils with special educational needs.

Education statistics from the Scottish Executive are divided between [school education](#)³² and [lifelong learning](#)³³. School education includes pupil and teacher information (taken from annual censuses) and statistics on attainment and qualifications. Lifelong learning includes data on further and higher education, student support and Education Maintenance Allowances. The publication [Pre-school and Childcare Statistics](#) gives information about early years education in Scotland, including tables of statistics.³⁴

Finance:

The [Annual Report](#)³⁵ of the Department for Education gives more detail of spending under the current responsibilities of the DfE. Equivalent information is given for the Scottish Executive on its [school expenditure](#)³⁶ pages, including some local authority data. However, significant differences in detail and definitions used in the various publications make them of limited use for comparison.

Higher and further education:

Further to the lifelong learning statistics provided by the Scottish Executive, UCAS [statistical services](#)³⁷ page links to their full range of published data on applications for full-time and sandwich undergraduate courses to be undertaken in the UK.

The Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) publishes annual UK data on students, teachers, finance and destination following graduation. [Online summaries](#)³⁸ leave out some detail, but do give an institution by institution breakdown and go back to 1994-95. Since 2002 HESA has also produced [performance indicators](#)³⁹ (degree course completion rates, participation, and employability) for each institution in the UK.

Regional:

Local area data is available from the Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics website via the [data download](#)⁴⁰ function. Data are classified into two main categories: Education, Skills and Training and Higher and Full Time Education.

I. Elections

Library Statisticians: Feargal McGuinness (x4310), Richard Cracknell (x4632)

Analysis of election results in Scotland can be found in Library research papers on UK General Elections and Scottish Parliament elections.

Further analysis of Scottish Parliamentary election results are provided on the Scottish Parliament website. At a basic level, their [Election Results](#)⁴³ page provides data for the 1999, 2003, 2007 and 2011 Scottish Parliamentary Elections. The Scottish Parliament Information Centre (SPICe) report [Election 2011](#)⁴⁴ discusses the context to the 2011 campaign and includes information on candidates and MSPs.

J. Energy & Environment

Library Statisticians: Paul Bolton (x6789), Oliver Hawkins (x2324)

The [Environment and Wildlife Statistics](#) pages on the website of the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) list summary statistics by topic and the principal related publications.⁴⁵ However, the majority of data is available only at UK or England level.

The primary source of data for Scotland is the [Environment Statistics](#) section of the Scottish Government website.⁴⁶ This is broken down into the following main sections: Global Atmosphere, Water, Land, Biodiversity, Air Quality, Marine and Waste. The annual booklet [Key Scottish Environment Statistics](#) contains a summary of key statistics on environmental trends in Scotland.⁴⁷ In addition, high level data are summarised in the PDF document [Environment Trends](#).⁴⁸

The energy information and statistics page on the Department of Energy and Climate (DECC) website lists all the main sources of energy statistics for the UK. [Energy Statistics](#)⁴⁹ gives access to all the data included in the department's energy publications. [Energy Trends](#)⁵⁰ is DECC's main bulletin of statistics on energy in the UK. This was published monthly until May 2001 and quarterly since June 2001.

K. Health Services & Public Health

Library Statisticians: Rachael Harker (x5061), Matthew Keep (x6789)

Health services:

Top level data on hospital and family health services for England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland, and workforce, diseases and deaths statistics for Great Britain, are contained in the Office of National Statistics' [Annual Abstract of Statistics](#).⁵¹

Information on health in Scotland is provided in the [Health and Community Care](#) statistics section of the Scottish Government website.⁵² This is split into information on Health Service Provision and the Health of Scotland's Population. High level statistics are summarised in the PDF document [Health and Community Care Trends](#).⁵³ In addition, health data for Scotland can be obtained from the [Information Services Division Scotland \(ISD\)](#),⁵⁴ including [waiting times](#)⁵⁵ and [workforce data](#)⁵⁶.

Health expenditure:

Details of top-level current and planned spending on UK health services – NHS, Personal Social Services and the Food Standards Agency – both in absolute terms and as a proportion of GDP, are outlined in chapter 7 of the Treasury's [Spending Review](#).⁵⁷

Headline figures for [health expenditure](#)⁵⁸ in Scotland are given in the health services provision section of the Scottish Executive website. This also gives a link to [Scottish Health Service Costs](#)⁵⁹, which is the only source of published costs information for NHS Scotland (NHSS), and provides a detailed analysis of where resources are spent.

Public health:

The ONS publication [Focus on Health](#)⁶⁰ provides data on the health of people living in the UK. Data are provided in the Health of Scotland's Population pages of the [Health and Community Care](#) section of the Scottish Executive website⁶¹.

Regional:

Local area data on a number of health service and public health topics, including community care, are available from the [Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics](#) website via the data download function⁶².

L. Housing

Library Statistician: Rachael Harker (x5061), Matthew Keep (x6789)

The Communities and Local Government publishes a monthly [house price index](#),⁶³ based on returns from major mortgage lenders through the Survey of Mortgage Lenders. Tables in the survey detail house price indices, house price inflation figures, mix-adjusted average house prices and median house prices for the UK. It is published at roughly 9.30am on the second Tuesday of each month.

Information on house building can be found in the quarterly [Housebuilding](#) Statistical Release⁶⁴, which shows the number of dwelling starts and completions for the latest available quarter in England and its regions, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The [Housing and Regeneration](#)⁶⁵ section of the Scottish Executive website is the main source of information on housing activity in Scotland. This includes data on public sector house sales, new house building, local authority lettings and evictions, homelessness, special needs housing, public sector stock and vacancy rates. It also includes information on mix-adjusted house prices, the number of loans and first time buyers in Scotland.

The [Scottish House Condition Survey](#)⁶⁶ looks at the physical condition of Scotland's homes as well as the experiences of householders. The [Scottish Household Survey](#),⁶⁷ which provides information on the attitudes, behaviour and characteristics of households and individuals on a range of issues.

Local area statistics are available on the Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics website via the data download function.

M. Immigration

Library Statisticians: Oliver Hawkins (x2324), Tom Rutherford (x4313)

The Office of National Statistics' produces a wide range of data on migration which is available on the [International Migration](#)⁶⁸ section of its website. This sets out the latest statistical releases on migration including the Long Term International Migration estimates which provide the headline measures of immigration, emigration and net migration in the UK.

The main source of information for Scotland is the [Migration](#)⁶⁹ section of the General Register Office for Scotland. The site includes the Registrar General's [Annual Review of Demographic Trends](#)⁷⁰.

The [Population and Migration](#)⁷¹ statistics section of the Scottish Executive website gives data on net migration, including a summary of high level statistics in the PDF document [Population and Migration Trends](#).⁷²

N. Labour Market

Library Statistician: Daniel Harari (x2464), Chris Rhodes (x2454)

Data is available from the ONS statistical release [Regional Labour Market Statistics](#) which is published every month.⁷³ Available statistics include unemployment, employment and economic inactivity, with time series and breakdowns by sex and age also available. Data for local areas, such as Parliamentary Constituencies and Local Authorities, are also available from this release.

Much of the ONS's data is also available in the [labour market statistics section](#) of the Scottish Government website.⁷⁴ In addition, statistics on public and private sector employment, earnings and numbers of young people who are not in education, employment or training (NEET) are also provided.

Labour market profiles of Local Authorities and Parliamentary Constituencies are available from the ONS's [nomisweb website](#).⁷⁵

O. Local Government Finance

Library Statisticians: Matthew Keep (x6789), Gavin Berman (x3851)

The [Local Government Finance](#)⁷⁶ section of the Scottish Government website contains a list of statistical reports and links to relevant [datasets](#)⁷⁷ for two main topic areas: Scottish Local Government Finance Statistics (data are available annually since 1995/96); and, Council Tax Information (in some instances data are available annually since 1993/94).

P. Population

Library Statisticians: Oliver Hawkins (x2324), Tom Rutherford (x4313)

Key population data for the UK, including some high level statistics for Scotland, are published in chapter 5 of the National Statistics [Annual Abstract of Statistics](#).⁷⁸

Data from the 2001 Census of Population is available from [General Register Offices for Scotland](#).⁷⁹ The vast majority of the census data can be obtained via the [Scotland Census On-line \(SCROL\)](#) website.⁸⁰ Most information can be viewed by council area, health board, civil parish, inhabited islands, Scottish Parliamentary Constituency and Scottish Parliamentary Region. The website also includes thematic maps for selected indicators. [Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics](#)⁸¹ also gives demographic data by area. Further to the 2001 census results, this includes annual statistics on births and deaths, life expectancy at birth and mid-year population estimates.

The [Population and Migration](#) section of the Scottish Government website provides a summary of the main statistics from the General Register Offices for Scotland.⁸² Key data are summarised in the PDF document [Population and Migration Trends](#).⁸³

Q. Social Security and Pensions

Library Statisticians: Richard Cracknell - Pensions (4632), Roderick McInnes – Pensions and Social Security (x3793), Tom Rutherford - Social Security (x4313)

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) [analytical services division](#) provides information on the number and types of social security benefits received, how much is received, how much it costs, along with information on the types of people receiving them.⁸⁴

[Benefits statistics A-Z](#) gives an alphabetical list of all the DWP and ONS statistical publications.⁸⁵

The DWP's [tabulation tool](#) gives benefit and pension statistics by numerous geographical denominators - Parliament Constituency (Westminster), Scottish Parliamentary Constituency, Government Office region, Local Authority and county.⁸⁶ Pension statistics not available on the tabulation tool can be found under the [Pensioners](#) tab, which provides a link to Pension Credit Parliamentary Constituency Statistics.⁸⁷

[Neighbourhood Statistics](#)⁸⁸ provides data on [individual types of benefit](#)⁸⁹ (income support, jobseeker's allowance, etc) for Wards and Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) all over Great Britain. Their [Working Age Client Group](#)⁹⁰ (WACG) data provides a breakdown of claimants - per Ward and LSOA - by their statistical group, gender and age. Pensioner Client Group data is unavailable at the time of writing, but should be published later in the year.

[The Inland Revenue](#) publishes quarterly statistics on Child Benefit, which includes data for Scotland.⁹¹

Headline figures for the number of people claiming unemployment benefits by local authority are given in the [labour market](#) section of the Scottish Government website.⁹² More detailed regional data on benefits and tax credits can be obtained from Scottish Neighbourhood Statistics via the [data download function](#).⁹³ Data are organised by client group as well as benefit claimed.

R. Transport

Library Statisticians: Matthew Keep (x6789), Tom Rutherford (x4313)

The [Department for Transport](#) (DfT) produces the key guide to general transport data,⁹⁴ with data tables and publications on a variety of transport related topics. For example, [Transport Statistics Great Britain](#) covers road, air, water and public transport, including some time-series data for Scotland.⁹⁵

The [Transport Scotland](#) website is the key source of information for Scotland.⁹⁶ A list of [publications and datasets](#) is available, showing for each publication: the current release; related datasets; and, previous editions.⁹⁷ The Transport Scotland website also includes a page dedicated to [high level summaries of statistics trends](#) covering subjects including: personal travel; freight transport; private transport; public transport; and, equality statistics.⁹⁸

The Office of Rail Regulation (ORR) compiles annual [station usage data](#) for the majority of railway stations in Great Britain. These consist of estimates of the total numbers of people entering, exiting and interchanging at rail stations.⁹⁹

The DfT Annual Report *Reported Road Casualties Great Britain* contains road accident statistics for the whole of Great Britain, with some also broken down by local authority or Government Office region. For Scotland, casualty data are available by road user type, severity and road class.¹⁰⁰
